General Information

Davidson Academy is a private, Christian, interdenominational, college-preparatory day school enrolling 728 students in grades K3-12. The 60-acre campus is located in the northern section of Metropolitan Nashville, Davidson County, Tennessee.

Students work independently under the guidance of faculty and non-faculty advisors. *In 2004, the Senior Research Project received the ASCI Honors Award for Exemplary School Program.*

A student's GPA is determined by averaging the quality point equivalent of the semester grades of all courses which the student has completed with the grade for each Carnegie unit being of equal value. The numerical average for AP courses is weighted by the addition of five (5) points to each grading period and the exam where the grade is 75 or above. The numerical average for Honors courses is weighted by the addition of three (3) points to each grading period and the exam where the grade is 75 or above. A numerical average of 101 – 105 in any AP course receives five (5) quality points.

Davidson Academy does not rank students; valedictorian and salutatorian are recognized.
